The YIVO Institute for Jewish Research recently launched the public phase of its **Centennial Campaign**, a transformative fundraising effort to safeguard the perpetuation of Jewish culture in an ever-changing global landscape.

For a century, YIVO has pioneered new forms of Jewish scholarship, research, education, and cultural expression. This campaign seeks to raise **\$40 million** to build new educational programs, expand exhibitions and public programs, and digitize the archives to increase accessibility while growing our institutional capacity to better serve our global community.

YIVO has raised **over \$36 million**, **90%** of its goal thanks to the generosity of early donors, foundations, and community partners.

LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR

Dear Friends,

Education unlocks minds and hearts. It impels us forward while opening doorways to the past. Through education, we retain old worlds and invent the new. It is the basis of civilization and the core of YIVO's mission. I spoke recently at the Lithuanian delegation to the European Union in Brussels about YIVO's preservation of over 500 years of the Jewish civilization of Eastern Europe. Afterward, one of the delegates said that, after listening to what I described, it was clear that YIVO was not simply the conservator of Jewish history, but rather that YIVO was a principal conservator of European history in its deepest sense. I have thought about that remark a great deal since our meeting and how the universalist values of Jewish tradition merged with the history and peoples of Europe over millennia, whether in religion, law, literature, music, philosophy, art, science, or the artifacts of daily life. This perspective offers fascinating new prospects for understanding the history of the Diaspora and for contemplating the deeper meaning of the traditions out of which we come that link us both to the Exodus from Egypt and the entry into modern civilization.

YIVO enters its second century set to successfully complete its transformative Centennial Campaign; undertake major, new educational initiatives; continue its digitization programs (our collections have been visited over one million times by people worldwide in 2025—the number keeps growing!); expand the reach of our public programs and fabulous new Learning and Media Center; and redesign our award-winning Online Museum through which we reach schools and the general public around the world.

At this time, we must also say farewell to our beloved Board Chairman, Ruth Levine, who has retired from this role as of January, but will remain a member of the YIVO board. Ruth's 10-year tenure as Chairman will be known as the period in which YIVO rebuilt itself, regained its ability to fulfill its historic mission, and found new beginnings. The staff of YIVO offers Ruth and her husband David, who has faithfully and brilliantly managed the YIVO endowment over this time, our deepest thanks.

YIVO welcomes with great anticipation Jacob (Jake) Morowitz as our new Board Chairman. Jake is a long-standing member of the YIVO Board, a true Yiddishist at heart and in action, and we welcome his vision for continuing to expand YIVO's activity and reach in all our work.



Treasures from the Collections

In celebration of its centennial, YIVO released a new video every Friday throughout 2025 highlighting a book, object, or artifact from its collections. Each short video featured a YIVO staff member discussing an item and explaining its historical significance. Videos included items ranging from Molly Picon's manuscript for her humorous song "A yid a shiker" and dolls created in a displaced persons camp in Florence, to a grager with a swastika created around the time of the Holocaust and a Yiddish translation of *Uncle Tom's Cabin*. All videos are now available on YIVO's YouTube channel, which has over 134,000 subscribers.

The Great Dictionary of the Yiddish Language

YIVO proudly presented the world premiere of *The Great Dictionary of the Yiddish Language*, a new chamber opera by Pulitzer Prize finalist and YIVO Director of Public Programs Alex Weiser with libretto by YIVO Director of Education Ben Kaplan. This moving, 50-minute work tells the true story of Yiddish linguist Yudel Mark and his unfinished quest to create a comprehensive Yiddish dictionary. Featuring an acclaimed cast of five singers and an ensemble led by David Bloom, the production—directed by Rebecca Miller Kratzer—brought Yiddish language and culture to life through music, mysticism, and history. The opera's three sold-out performances were presented as part of YIVO's Centennial Celebration and annual Nusakh Vilne memorial program.

The Tourist's Guide to Lost Yiddish New York City

Several hundred people joined YIVO for a lively book talk with author Henry H. Sapoznik and moderator Eddy Portnoy, YIVO's Senior Academic Advisor & Director of Exhibitions, on the recently published *The Tourist's Guide to Lost Yiddish New York City*. Drawing on over five thousand Yiddish and English newspaper articles, Sapoznik explored the city's rich Yiddish cultural history—from theater and music to journalism, architecture, and even crime. The discussion offered fresh insights into how Yiddish culture shaped New York from 1880 to today, revealing its creativity, resilience, and lasting influence.

100 Objects from the Collections of the YIVO Institute for Jewish Research

YIVO celebrated the publication of *100 Objects from the Collections of the YIVO Institute for Jewish Research* with two special events highlighting the organization's century of collecting. The first, held at the Grolier Club, featured editor and YIVO Director of Collections Stefanie Halpern in conversation about how the book chronicles modern Jewish history through 100 extraordinary artifacts. The second, at 92NY, brought together Halpern, Jonathan Brent, and Eddy Portnoy for a discussion moderated by Rabbi David Ingber.

Learning and Media Center



Students Discover Jewish History at the YIVO Learning and Media Center

Since the YIVO Learning and Media Center's (YLMC) June opening, we have had a whirlwind of visits from high schools, colleges, universities, and other institutions. In the latter half of 2025 alone, we hosted 19 group visits totaling 300 visitors, including Kushner Yeshiva students for a special introduction to YIVO, with a talk by Eddy Portnoy on archival research for his book *Bad Rabbi*. Other visits brought ① Jewish Theological Seminary students from a class on Yiddish theater for a show-and-tell focused entirely on Yiddish theater; ② The New School students from a course on Jewish ethnography for a tour of YIVO's archival stacks; and ③ Columbia University students from class on Zionist thought and ideology for a lesson exploring reproductions of archival materials pertaining to Zionist youth groups in Eastern Europe.

The Abraham Joshua Heschel School

On November 7, 2025, ten 11th grade students accompanied by their teacher Max Lazar from The Abraham Joshua Heschel School visited the YIVO Learning and Media Center for a special lesson dedicated to Yiddish theater. During their visit, the students were introduced to the history of YIVO and the Esther Rokhl Kaminska Theater Museum. The students toured YIVO's Centennial exhibitions, explored the Learning and Media Center, and after a presentation about the global history of the Yiddish theater, received a show-and-tell presentation of some of YIVO's archival treasures by Director of Collections Stefanie Halpern.

The visiting students had prepared for their time at YIVO beforehand with an assigned reading from *New York's Yiddish Theater: From The Bowery to Broadway* chosen by YLMC Educator Susannah Trubman. The Heschel students watched selected clips from Yiddish films and in an open conversation with Trubman, asked thoughtful questions about the material they had encountered and the work that they had read.

YIVO Hosts Gala Marking its 100th Anniversary

Over 300 guests attended the YIVO Institute for Jewish Research's Centennial Gala in November 2025 at Tribeca 360, marking a milestone year for the organization and raising nearly \$900K.

The evening honored Sir Simon Schama—renowned historian, author, and University Professor of Art History and History at Columbia University—for his extraordinary contributions to historical scholarship and public education, alongside Ruth and David Levine for their decades of leadership, service, and philanthropic support of YIVO. Sir Simon was recognized for his landmark body of work, including award-winning books and acclaimed BBC documentaries. Ruth Levine, a native Yiddish speaker and outgoing YIVO Board Chair, was celebrated for her lifelong dedication to YIVO's mission, while David Levine was honored for his distinguished career and longstanding service to nonprofit institutions, including YIVO.

The program was followed by a reception hosted by Lithuania's Permanent Representative to the EU, Ambassador Nerijus Aleksiejūnas. YIVO Executive Director Jonathan Brent spoke at both events, highlighting YIVO's rich history and its dynamic future.

Renowned Scholar Samuel Kassow Joins YIVO as Research Historian



This November, Samuel D. Kassow, one of the foremost historians of Eastern European Jewry and the Holocaust, joined YIVO as Visiting Research Historian. Dr. Kassow will contribute his distinguished scholarship and decades of experience to advance YIVO's mission across research, education, and public engagement. Dr. Kassow will work closely with YIVO fellows, contribute to online and in-person exhibitions, and teach in the YIVO-Bard Winter Program on Ashkenazi Civilization, as well as in the YIVO-Bard MA Program in Yiddish Civilization that Bard College and YIVO intend to build. He will also advise on the Jan Karski and Pola Nirenska Prize, awarded for outstanding scholarship in Polish-Jewish studies, mentor students in the Max Weinreich Center for Advanced Jewish Studies, and contribute his expertise to YIVO's future initiatives.

FEATURED ARTIFACT

The Collection of Israel Zajd

In the early 1970s, Israel Zajd sought to write a book on Morgnshtern, the sports organization of the Jewish Labor Bund established in 1926. Zajd served as the secretary of the Executive Committee of Morgnshtern in Poland, a position he held until the outbreak of WWII. Morgnshtern attempted to attract young Jewish workers by putting key Bundist principles into practice through sport—socialism, working-class consciousness, internationalism, and the promotion of Yiddish culture. Morgnshtern encouraged group activities such as gymnastics, hiking, cycling, swimming, and eurhythymics. Zajd compiled dozens of scrapbooks containing original and typed materials documenting the history and activities of Morgnshtern during the 1920s and 1930s: leadership and conference proceedings; competitions and meets; sports clubs; and participation in the Workers' Olympiads. Included in the collection are striking collages such as the above left image of two gymnasts enthusiastically demonstrating their skills against an industrial backdrop of factories and smokestacks. Though Zajd's monograph was never finished, his collection is a rich resource for those hoping to better understand the organization.



"Yiddish Pills" and Summer Thrills: Reconstituting Yiddishism at Camp Hemshek

looked in accounts of Jewish education and identity-building—used the camp to reimagine Yiddish culture for a new generation. Drawing from her book *The Jews of Summer: Summer Camp and Jewish Culture in Postwar America*, Fox examined how Camp Hemshek's founders envisioned sleepaway camp as a remedy for cultural decline, shaping a new postwar Yiddishism rooted in community and education. This program was the second in YIVO's ongoing series held in conjunction with the Jewish Labor and Political Archives (JLPA) digitization project.

Sandra Fox explored how postwar Jewish leaders, especially Yiddishists, turned to summer camps as vital spaces for cultural renewal. Focusing on Camp Hemshek, Fox illuminated how Yiddishists—often over-







The Collection of Mira Jedwabnik Van Doren

YIVO received the collection of artist, filmmaker, and daughter of Vilna, Mira Jedwabnik Van Doren. The Mira Jedwabnik Van Doren Vilna Collection includes taped interviews and accompanying transcripts of survivors from Vilna, notable Yiddish personalities, writers, artists, and scholars including Abraham Sutzkever, Samuel Bak, Fira Bramson, Bina Weinreich, Chana Mlotek, Benjamin Harshav, and many others. These interviews, as well as the thousands of photographs, documents, and manuscripts detailing life in Vilna before the war that comprise the collection were used in Jedwabnik Van Doren's acclaimed documentary *The World Was Ours*, which showcases four centuries of Jewish life in Vilna before the war. This collection stands as a testament to Mira Jedwabnik Van Doren's devotion to preserving and sharing this vibrant history and will be of great use to scholars and students interested in creating new projects that draw on her important work.



Letters from Sholem Aleichem

B. Cassel was the editor of the newsletter of the Keidaner Association. An epistolary relationship developed between him and Sholem Aleichem. Cassel's grandson, Andrew W. Cassel, has now donated 19 pages, in Yiddish and in Russian, of letters from Sholem Aleichem, as well as from the latter's son-in-law, Yiddish and Hebrew writer Y. D. Berkowitz, and from Olga Rabinowitz, Sholem Aleichem's wife. These letters provide evidence of Sholem Aleichem's strenuous efforts to be translated, his financial worries, and his admiration for the cultural Zionist, Judah Magnes.

Volunteering at the YIVO Archives

During the seven years I have volunteered at YIVO's archives, I have seen remarkable things.

In the collection of a German Jewish family that left Berlin in 1940, their Third Reich passports stamped with a big red J. In a collection of research papers concerning my mother's village in Belarus, eyewitness accounts of the September 1942 murder of the town's Jews including my great-grandparents.

I feel a deep connection to the documents I review and organize in my work at YIVO. They all tell a story, and sometimes that story comes very close to me.

Currently, I am working under the supervision of Project Archivist Ettie Goldwasser on the extensive archives of the Workmen's Circle (*Arbeter Ring*), an organization founded in New York in 1900. The Arbeter Ring continued the mission of the Jewish Labor Bund in the New World.

It is part of my own family story. My father was a member of *Tsukunft*, the youth movement of the Bund before the Second World War in Grodno, then a part of Poland. And my parents joined the Arbeter Ring not long after their arrival in New York to enjoy the social network and the health benefits. My brother and I learned folk dancing at Camp Kinder Ring in the mid-sixties. As part of a review of the Arbeter Ring files, I smiled when I came upon advertisements for Camp Kinder Ring from that period ("a wholesome setting").

One afternoon I was amazed to find a letter from the early 1950s about my husband's great-uncle Benjamin Brandzel, who was a Chicago trade unionist in the garment industry. When my in-laws first arrived in the United States in 1948, Uncle Bennie helped my late father-in-law, Chaim, with his first job at Hart Schaffner & Marx. After Chaim suggested some labor-saving innovations for a machine, Uncle Bennie told Chaim that he was not "worker material."

Why do I volunteer at YIVO? Because the archives document and bring to life the emergence of Eastern European Jews into the secular world. They celebrate creativity and tell us of the dreams and passions of Jews who lived before us. They are the best possible reminder that the Jews who were murdered during the Second World War were not only victims.

As the daughter and daughter-in-law of Shoah survivors, I have no doubt that YIVO holds our most valuable legacy and offers it to all. That is why you will find me with my sharpened pencil at the YIVO Archives every week.



LIBRARY HIGHLIGHT

Reorganizing the Strashun Rabbinic Collection

For several weeks, the Library has been reorganizing the Strashun Rabbinic collection. Items in this collection have periodically been misshelved due to the complexity of its call number system: each book is labeled with a double vov, a number, and another Hebrew letter or two; usually, there is then another number and a date. You can see the ease with which one might accidentally misplace an item. One of the joys of this cleanup effort—beyond the satisfaction of seeing everything beautifully arranged!—has been finding misshelved items and having the opportunity to examine them closely. Items have included *siddurim* dating as far back as 1771 and a miniature set of the Babylonian Talmud. Equally fascinating are volumes from the 18th and 19th centuries stamped with personal names and annotated by the original readers. Each book we open emphasizes the fact that this collection contains not only sacred texts, but sacred history.





Antanas Ulpis Posthumously Receives Award for Advancing Lithuanian-Jewish Relations and Understanding

YIVO, in partnership with the Martynas Mažvydas National Library of Lithuania, proudly awarded the inaugural Award for Advancing Lithuanian-Jewish Relations and Understanding on October 17, 2025. This first-ever award honors Antanas Ulpis, former Director of the Lithuanian National Book Chamber, who received the distinction posthumously for his extraordinary courage and moral vision during the Soviet period. At great personal risk, Ulpis saved thousands of Jewish books and archival materials slated for destruction by Soviet authorities, safeguarding priceless records of Jewish scholarship, culture, and daily life. His selfless actions ensured the survival of a cultural legacy that continues to educate generations around the world.

Alytus St. Benedict Gymnasium Students in Lithuania Commemorate the Holocaust



On September 23, 2025, students from the Alytus St. Benedict Gymnasium in Alytus, Lithuania, commemorated National Memorial Day for the Genocide of Lithuanian Jews with a series of posters inspired by YIVO's online exhibition, *Beba Epstein: The Extraordinary Life of an Ordinary Girl*, translated into Lithuanian with the support of the Lithuanian Ministry of Foreign Affairs. The first exhibition in the YIVO Bruce and Francesca Cernia Slovin Online Museum, *The Extraordinary Life of an Ordinary Girl* explores Eastern European Jewish life in the 20th and 21st centuries through the true story of Beba Epstein, whose autobiography is the centerpiece of the exhibition. **Two New Volumes
Published in the
Yiddish Voices
Translation Series**



The latest two volumes in the *Yiddish Voices* series, a partnership between YIVO and Bloomsbury, were published in summer 2025. The first, *The Destruction of Dubova: Chronicle of a Dead City*, is a searing account of pogrom violence by the writer and documentarian Rokhl Faygnberg, and the second, *The Mother of Yiddish Theatre: Memoirs of Ester-Rokhl Kaminska*, is the memoir of the Yiddish actress and diva Ester-Rokhl Kaminska. Both works were published exactly a century ago, in Warsaw in 1926. Both Kaminska and Faygnberg were exceptional as women cultural pioneers, and both were witness to the vitality and fragility of Ukrainian Jewish life and interwar Polish culture.
